Behind Closed Doors:

Making Defensible High Stakes Progression Decisions in Competency-Based Health Professions Education



Description

Groups such as Clinical Competency Committees are tasked with making high stakes summative decisions, in both undergraduate and postgraduate health professions education, to ensure that learners have met the requirements to progress to the next stage of their training and ready for appropriate levels of independent practice.

These groups review assessment information about individual learners to make a judgement on their performance against a set of performance standards, provide feedback to learners and implement a remediation action plan if appropriate.

This half-day workshop seeks to enhance participants' knowledge and skills in making high stakes summative progression decisions. Using a case study learning approach, participants will practice reviewing sample scenarios and assessment information about individual learners to make a judgement on their performance against a set of performance standards.

Duration

0.5 day

Programme Content

- 1. Challenges of making high stakes summative progression decisions
- 2. Principles of group decision making processes
- 3. Best practices in making defensible high stakes progression decisions
- 4. Practice in making high stakes progressions decisions using sample scenarios

Residency programme directors, associate programme directors, members of clinical competency committee and members of progression review committees in health professions education, as well as faculty leaders responsible for staff development

- 2. Apply principles of group decision making processes and best practices in making defensible high stakes progression decisions
- 3. Apply skills of making high stakes progression decisions through practice in small group exercises using sample scenarios
