**Healthcare Humanity Award Celebrates 10th Anniversary –
With Record Winners and New Accolade**

The Healthcare Humanity Award (HHA) celebrates its 10th anniversary this year with a record number of recipients – 76 to be precise – and a new Honourable Mention category to recognise the extraordinary efforts of healthcare staff across Singapore.

This year's HHA recipients hail from 26 public hospitals, polyclinics, nursing homes and related organisations. Senior Consultant Dr Anton Cheng Kui Sing, 66, from Alexandra Health, is the eldest winner, while the youngest is 24-year-old paramedic Nurulefyana Binte Badrulhisham from Unistrong Technology, a private ambulance operator. These unique individuals inspire and lead their peers – and us – in helping to make our Singapore healthcare system world class.

Eight winners were singled out as recipients of the inaugural Honourable Mention award, which was introduced to celebrate the HHA's 10th anniversary.

"The Honourable Mention Awards recognise those who have gone beyond their call of duty and ventured into humanitarian efforts – either locally or beyond our shores, some of whom have demonstrated immense courage," said Madam Kay Kuok, Chairman of the Board of Trustees for The Courage Fund, in her opening address.

President Dr Tony Tan Keng Yam, Patron of The Courage Fund, is Guest-of-Honour at the Awards presentation ceremony on 14 May 2014.

HHA recipients will each take home a silver medallion and cash prize of \$1,500. Honourable Mention Award winners will receive an additional \$500 cash prize.

This prestigious annual award was established after the SARS outbreak in Singapore in 2003, when healthcare workers went beyond the call of duty and risked their lives to take care of SARS patients and help keep Singapore SARS-free. Their dedication and courage touched the hearts of Singaporeans who then showed their gratitude by donating generously to The Courage Fund.

Since its inception in 2004, the Award has given about \$1million to 593 healthcare workers who have inspired us with their commitment to deliver quality care and their exemplary compassion and empathy for their patients.

The 2014 Healthcare Humanity Award and Honourable Mention Heroes and Heroines share their stories

Whether in the community, polyclinic or hospital ward, many of this year's winners showed extraordinary grit and tenacity in the face of uphill tasks to accomplish their goal of achieving better healthcare for their patients. Here are some of their heart-warming stories.

National Healthcare Group Polyclinics Senior Staff Nurse Ms Katherine Tan, 52, has volunteered in some 33 overseas mission trips to help provide medical care to rural communities in Vietnam and China. For many years, she volunteered with Operation Smile, a charitable group that provides free surgery for children born with cleft lip or cleft palate deformities.

"My greatest satisfaction as a healthcare worker is to see patients whom I have taken care of recover from their ailments and move on," said Ms Tan.

This Honourable Mention Award recipient is also an advocate of women's health and wellness, constantly taking the time to educate her female patients about the benefits of breast self-examinations and regular PAP smears.

Tan Tock Seng Hospital Senior Consultant Dr Tan Kok Leong, 46, always listens to his patients and their caregivers to understand their issues and challenges. He then tries to help them to the best of his abilities. This Family Physician firmly believes in teamwork and never hesitates to approach other healthcare partners to engage their help in providing holistic care for his patients. In 2012, he spearheaded the Virtual Hospital Programme for patients suffering from chronic diseases. As a result, these patients' readmissions to TTSH's Emergency Department dropped significantly, and they were able to recover in the comfort of their own homes.

"Effective teamwork is the core of healthcare," Dr Tan said. "It entails empathy, respect, and the willingness to hear and learn from each other, including the patients."

He would go the extra mile to ensure that his patients receive timely treatment. For example, he still makes home visits even after hours, and he would personally visit patients at home to persuade them to be admitted for treatments, where necessary.

Death can be a scary destination for many sick and frail patients. ***Tan Tock Seng Hospital Advanced Practice Nurse, Ms Chen Wei Ting***, 34, helps make their last journey more comfortable. She works in palliative care which focuses on alleviating suffering in patients. To ensure this, she goes beyond the call of duty to help them fulfil their last wishes, often giving of her time and effort to her patients and their families.

"As I am in palliative care, my desire is to help patients die with peace of mind and dignity," said Ms Chen. "It is a privilege to be able to be part of their last days."

Institute of Mental Health Consultant Dr Dhanesh Kumar's devotion to his patients suffering from mental illness is commendable. He shows great compassion and does not just treat his patients for their illness but goes to great lengths to help them adjust to their lives with their families at home and in the community.

“Sometimes I have to make difficult decisions,” Dr Kumar said. “But my priority is always to put my patients’ interests and well-being first.”

Dr Kumar, 51, has also been doing humanitarian work in India since 2011, providing mental health training to primary health care doctors and health workers, besides organising mental health awareness and free consultation camps. He has also treated severely mentally ill patients – who were literally chained in the community – mostly by their own families. Six such patients have since been freed, and two are even working now, thanks to his courageous intervention.

National Skin Centre Senior Consultant Associate Professor Steven Thng, 46, was commended for setting up the melanocyte culture laboratory at the National Skin Centre – with his own sweat and skin cells. To help generate enough skin samples in the laboratory’s early days of vitiligo research, the dermatologist gamely volunteered his own cells for testing. He has not stopped since then.

Although he still bears scars on his forearms, his tenacious efforts have paid off. Today, NSC’s pigment clinic provides the most comprehensive treatment options for patients with vitiligo in the region.

“As long as I have positively touched someone each day, be it addressing his or her medical problem, I am happy,” A/Prof Thng said.

Through the course of her work, **National Healthcare Group Diagnostics Senior Medical Technologist Ms Janet Teng** noticed a high rate of contamination in urine specimens due to improper collection techniques. To help patients collect urine more effectively, the 33-year-old developed instruction diagrams to be placed in toilet cubicles at the clinics. However, she met with strong objections from her colleagues due to the sensitive subject matter. Undeterred, Ms Teng persisted – by conducting trials and engaging her colleagues. Now, the instructions are widely used in the polyclinics, and specimen contamination has been reduced by more than 50%.

“Working in a busy laboratory with a high patient load is both physically and mentally taxing,” she admitted. “But it warms my heart when I know that I am making a difference to someone’s life.”

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About The Courage Fund and Healthcare Humanity Awards (HHA)

The Courage Fund was launched in 2003 to raise money for relief to SARS victims and healthcare workers. It was so named as a tribute to the bravery and dedication of healthcare staff during the outbreak.

The Fund is jointly organised by the National Healthcare Group (NHG), Singapore Health Services (SingHealth), Singapore Medical Association (SMA), Singapore Nurses’ Association (SNA) and Singapore Press Holdings (SPH).

The Fund’s objectives are three-fold:

1. To provide relief to SARS victims and healthcare workers and their dependents, and any persons placed under quarantine orders as a result of SARS.
2. To support any charitable purposes for the benefit of healthcare workers, especially in relation to the advancement of education, the protection of health and the relief of poverty, distress and sickness.
3. To support any charitable purposes for the benefit of the general Singapore community who may be affected by widespread infectious diseases.

The Healthcare Humanity Award (HHA) is a lasting legacy of the Courage Awards originally presented in 2003 to the healthcare heroes and heroines of the SARS outbreak. About 5,500 Courage Awards were presented in 2003. It was replaced the following year by the HHA which has saluted the efforts of 517 healthcare workers since 2004.

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ANNEX 1: Profiles of HHA Honourable Mention Winners 2014

1. Ms Katherine Tan Gek Tee **Senior Staff Nurse** **National Healthcare Group Polyclinics**

Ms Katherine is an avid volunteer and has gone for over 30 mission trips to Vietnam and China. For many years, she volunteered with Operation Smile, a charitable group that performs free surgery for children born with cleft lip and cleft palate deformity. She also rendered her services to a Christian medical group to serve the Yi minority in China, providing free health screening for the under-privileged community with high prevalence of HIV and tuberculosis.

“My greatest satisfaction is to see patients recover from their ailments and move forward in their lives.”

2. Ms Lim Kim Yan **Nurse Clinician** **Tan Tock Seng Hospital**

Ms Lim is always ready to help anyone in need. Most recently, she helped raise funds for the victims of Hurricane Sandy in New York. In the last few years she has been on medical mission trips to Sri Lanka and Indonesia. Back home in Singapore, she often helps out at free health screening events.

“Humanitarian work is not constrained by race, religion or even geographical boundaries.”

3. Ms Low Pey Yun **Paramedic** **Singapore Civil Defence Force**

Ms Low showed extreme bravery in the face of danger. She responded to a road traffic accident where a pedestrian was pinned under a bus. That led to crowds of angry onlookers who started hurling projectiles at her and her colleagues.

“Good judgment and decisions can make a difference between life and death to the victims we are sent to help. This can be very stressful but it’s also very rewarding.”

4. Ms Nor Aisyah Binte Johari **Paramedic**

Singapore Civil Defence Force

Although she and her colleagues faced a hostile crowd when they responded to a road accident, Ms Nor Aisyah did not shirk from trying to do what she had to. She was hurt in the incident and underwent counselling to help overcome the trauma. Ms Nor Aisyah is now back at work, saving lives as a paramedic.

“It’s stressful having to deal with trauma patients in the course of my work. But when I help save lives, that gives me the strength to help the next patient.”

5. Ms Nur Hidayah Binte Bujang Paramedic Singapore Civil Defence Force

In the face of danger, in the midst of an angry mob at the scene of a road accident, Ms Nur Hidayah rose above the situation and managed to convey three casualties to hospital. Her courage is highly commended.

“As a paramedic, I need to stay calm so that I can think clearly to give the best possible treatment to the patients. It’s gratifying to know that I’ve played a part when patients survive their trauma.”

6. Ms Nurulefyana Binte Badrulhisham Paramedic Unistrong Technology Pte Ltd

For Ms Nurulefyana, working as a paramedic gives her an adrenaline rush every time she has to deal with an emergency. On 8 Dec 2013, when she and her colleagues were sent to attend to a road accident victim, they were faced with an angry mob at the accident site. In the face of danger and a volatile situation, she managed to eventually convey six casualties to hospital, including the victim who was pinned under a bus.

“It’s beyond words when you’re able to revive a cardiac arrest patient from pulseless to pulse!”

7. Dr Puneet Seth Consultant Singapore General Hospital

As an emergency physician, Dr Seth works under a lot of stress but he always greets his patients with a smile and connects well with them. He firmly believes that healing begins with the first contact, and that's with healthcare workers. Dr Seth feels that a calm and reassuring doctor or nurse can make the worst suffering a little more tolerable.

“Healthcare workers may be brilliant doctors or nurses, but to patients, healthcare workers are no more than assembly line technicians if they are not attentive and caring. Patients come to us for a reason and mental agony is as much a part of a disease as its physical impact on the body.”

**8. Ms Shek Mei Poh
Senior Occupational Therapist
Institute of Mental Health**

Ms Shek's dedication to the rehabilitation of those suffering from mental illness is commendable. She reaches out to them at a personal level and not as someone in authority. Ms Shek also works closely with her patients and is not afraid even when they turn violent. She initiated a quality improvement programme at IMH to improve the quality of life of long-term patients in the wards.

“Helping patients recover and then go back to their normal lives makes my job meaningful.”

1. Mr Abdul Farouk Bin Abdul Latiff **Nurse Clinician** **Jurong Health Services**

Mr Abdul Farouk is always ready to volunteer his clinical services at places where major disasters strike. Since he joined the Singapore Red Cross in 2005, he has been on medical missions to Pakistan in the aftermaths of its earthquakes. More recently, he has been to the Philippines after it was hit by Typhoon Haiyan. Locally, he is also active in community work, using his skills as a nurse to help those in need.
