





More Women Going For Breast Cancer Screening in the Community

In 2018, the number of women who went for breast cancer screening for the **first time** more than doubled under the Community Mammobus Programme; the number of first-time screeners rose from 925 in 2017 to 1,953 in 2018.

Since the Community Mammobus Programme's launch in January 2018, the total number of women who were screened rose by about 68 per cent (from 2,549 in 2017 to 4,273 in 2018).

The growth in numbers can be attributed to efforts made to make breast cancer screening more accessible and affordable for eligible women. These included partnering more community centres and corporate organisations for the Programme, which is a collaboration between the National Healthcare Group Diagnostics (NHGD), the Breast Cancer Foundation (BCF), and the Singapore Cancer Society (SCS). In 2018, 81 organisers engaged this Programme, up 37 per cent from 59 organisations in 2017.

Bringing Breast Cancer Screening into the Community

The Community Mammobus Programme provides breast cancer screening for women at community centres and workplaces. Given the positive results, and to encourage more women to get screened for breast cancer, NHGD, BCF, and SCS have extended their collaboration to January 2020. This extension allows eligible women, aged between 40 and 69, to participate in screenings at subsidised rates, ranging from \$0 to \$35. In addition, a second Mammobus will be rolled out later this year to expand screening capabilities.

This Programme is important in the fight against breast cancer, the principal cause of cancer deaths among women in Singapore. By making breast cancer screening within easy reach, screening take-up rates have increased, enabling earlier detection, and therefore, better health outcomes for the population.

"We are privileged to partner SCS and BCF in making mammogram screening more accessible, convenient, and affordable to eligible women with the NHGD Mammobus. Through this tripartite effort, we have successfully reached out to more women, particularly those who are screening for the first time. Organisations and community leaders have been supportive, and there was a 40 per cent increase in screening events organised for their workforce, residents, and tenants over the past year. Such screenings support the Ministry of Health (MOH)'s objective of placing more emphasis on health instead of healthcare. With the success of the programme, the three partners have decided to extend it to benefit more women."

Annex

Breast Cancer in Singapore

Breast cancer is the most prevalent cancer among women in Singapore, affecting three out of 10 women diagnosed with cancer. The incidence of breast cancer has more than doubled over the past 40 years, from 24.6 to 65.3 per 100,000 women. Each year, there are about 1,930 newly diagnosed cases of breast cancer, and about 420 deaths.¹ One in 15 Singaporean women develops breast cancer by the age of 75.²

Who is eligible for Mammobus screening?

- Singaporeans and Permanent Residents
- Women between the age of 40 and 49* who have not had a mammogram in the past 12 months
- Women aged 50 and above who have not had a mammogram in the past 24 months
- Women who have not breastfed for the past 6 months
- Not pregnant
- No breast implants
- No history of breast cancer
- Women who have not experienced any breast cancer symptoms such as breast lumps, changes in size or shape of breast, recent history of nipple retraction, bloody nipple discharge, itch and rash on nipple, skin redness or skin sore on the breast

*Women between 40 and 49 years old are eligible for screening but they should talk to their doctor about the benefits and limitations of mammograms in this age group so that they can make an informed choice about going for screening.
